Hole By Hole Descriptions

1 - 383 yards, Par 4

Uphill dogleg left is guarded by a large fairway bunker and OB on the left. The perfect tee shot is towards the right fairway bunker, setting up a short to mid-iron to a shallow green.

2 - 346 yards, Par 4

Sharp dogleg left, lay up short of the big oak, leaving a short to mid-iron approach to elevated green or try to hit a big driver past it. An o.k. drive will place you squarely behind the tree.

3 - 552 yards, Par 5

This long, three-shot par 5 emphasizes placement over length. Out of bounds runs along both sides of fairway, but avoid the left side at all cost. The second shot's line is toward the far right fairway bunker, setting up a short iron to a well-bunkered green.

4 - 184 yards, Par 3

Prevailing wind is usually in your face. OB on left and hazard on right guard hole. A high tee ball is required to carry bunker front left and still hold the green.

5 - 446 yards, Par 5

Long hitters can reach uphill par 5 in two. Smart play is lay up second short of fairway bunkers, leaving short iron to elevated green. Deep bunkers protect both sides and a severe false front kicks short approaches off.

6 - 318 yards, Par 4

Known as The Beast! Hit off the tee on the short grass. Out of bounds on both sides is definitely in play. Once in the fairway, a downhill, short to mid-iron approach shot to a shallow green remains.

7 - 155 yards, Par 3

Intimidating par 3 can make or break round. Bailout to left or give it a go! There is almost a 20-yard difference in carry length between playing to the left and right sides of the green.

8 - 360 yards, Par 4

Willow Creek guards left side, catching errant tee shots and foolish approaches to well-guarded green. Drive just to the right of the majestic oak for a short to mid-iron second shot to the right half of the green.

9 - 505 yards, Par 5

Long hitters can reach easy par 5 in two. Line off tee is between straightaway fairway bunker and stand of trees on right. Go too far right and you're OB. Either lay up your second shot or go for it as you approach this very deep green.

10 - 178 yards, Par 3

Trouble left and right. Shots too long and left will catch the slope, throwing the ball toward cart path and big score. Straight balls to large forward sloping green will be rewarded.

11 - 475 yards, Par 5

Long, dogleg right par 5 requires two solid shots to set up a short to mid-iron, uphill approach to smallish green. Tee shot just to the left of the right side bunkers, setting up a fairway wood second shot to a tightening landing area. Par here is well earned!

12 - 155 yards, Par 3

Out of bounds tight on left and severe drop off to right rewards straight tee shot and penalizes the rest.

13 - 315 yards, Par 4

The prevailing winds push you right toward the OB, so favor the left side off tee. A short to mid-iron to this well-bunkered, multi-tiered green. Don't be fooled when reading putts; the general slope of the terrain dominates.

14 - 390 yards, Par 4

Short, dogleg left par 4 can be easy par or double bogey! Draw tee shot to set up short to mid-iron over barranca that fronts shallow green. Avoid fairway bunkers to right off the tee; they definitely come into play.

15 - 501 yards, Par 5

This gentle dogleg left requires a BIG tee shot followed by a longer fairway metal. Stay right as approaches to smallish, but deep green can be blocked from left side. Six is a VERY good score.

16 - 183 yards, Par 3

Fun par 3 plays from elevated tee, requiring 1-2 clubs less than yardage. With prevailing winds blowing from right-to-left, OB on left definitely into play.

17 - 333 yards, Par 4

Very picturesque par 4 can be an easy par or ruin a good round. Smart play is a tee shot right of the fairway bunkers, leaving short iron to the green. Aggressive players will carry the bunkers on the left, leaving half-wedge in. Anything further left or long brings trouble and out-of bounds to bear!

18 - 406 yards, Par 4

Cut off as much as you want with driver, or lay up with a long iron or fairway wood at the right fairway bunker. Large undulating greens hold well.



Tournament History

Bruno Event Team welcomes our new title sponsor CVS/pharmacy as they host this event at the Blackhawk Country Club in Danville, California. The 6,185-yard, par-72 course will be the backdrop as the top LPGA players take aim over this four-round event.

In 1996 the tournament was known as the Twelve Bridges LPGA Classic. Between 1997 and 2008 the tournament was known as the Longs Drugs Challenge. In 2006, the tournament was moved from Northern California's Sacramento area to its current location in Northern California's East Bay. In 2009 the tournament was officially renamed to the CVS/pharmacy LPGA Challenge.

Tournament Winners

Last Year, In-Kyung Kim (67-69-69-73=278) notched her first-career win with a 10-under-par 278, to become the season's eighth Rolex First-Time Winner and the final winner of the Longs Drugs Challenge. Kim, who held the lead since the second round on Friday, made birdies on the final two holes on Sunday to seal her three-stroke win over Angela Stanford (70-69-67-75 =281, -7).

In 2007, Suzann Pettersen (75-65-64-73=277) fought off Lorena Ochoa (69-70-67-71=277) in a playoff after Ochoa overcoming a two-stroke deficit entering the final round with a 1-under-par 71 on Sunday afternoon. Pettersen outlasted the Rolex Rankings number one player in a two-hole, sudden-death playoff to claim her third victory on the LPGA Tour this year.

In 2006, Karrie Webb held off a hard-charging Annika Sorenstam with a clutch two-foot par putt on #18 to clinch a one-stroke win. Webb, who finished with a final round 70, pared the last five holes as Sorenstam, who playing in the group ahead of her, fired a final round 65.

In 2005, Nicole Perrot fired an even par 71 in her final round to become the first Chilean-born player to win an LPGA Tour event. Her final score of 14-under 270 was one stroke ahead of Hee-Won Han, who had won the previous week in Los Angeles.

In 2004, Christina Kim sunk a birdie putt on hole 17 to secure her first LPGA victory in front of family and friends. Kim, who is from San Jose, posted a 18-under 266 en route to the win, holding off LPGA Hall of Famers Webb and Juli Inkster. Webb, who was paired with Kim in the final round, missed a birdie putt from eight feet on the 18th green to force a playoff. Kim posted a final round 65 to win by one over Webb and two over Inkster, who was the second round leader.

In 2003, Helen Alfredsson shot a 2-under 70 on Sunday and picked up her first victory since 1998 after Pat Hurst's double bogey on the final hole. She made an 18-inch par putt on the 18th hole to tie a tournament record with a 13-under 275 and defeat Hurst, Grace Park, Rachel Hetherington, Se Ri Pak and Yong Yeon Lee by one stroke.

2002 saw Cristie Kerr bring home her first LPGA title with an eight-under-par 280 (66-72-67-75). The six-year Tour veteran entered the final round with a five stroke lead over Jane Crafter and went on to a wire-to-wire finish over 2001 Louise Suggs Rolex Rookie of the Year Hee-Won Han, who finished one stroke back at 281 (74-70-67-70).

In 2001, Se Ri Pak defeated the weather, and Annika Sorenstam, who was gunning for a fifth straight win on Tour. The event was shortened to 54 holes after inclement weather forced the cancellation of Friday's round. Pak carded 66-71-71 to finish at 208 (-8), two strokes ahead of Laura Diaz. In the final round, Pak played the back nine strong with back-to-back birdies on holes 16 and 17, which took her to eight-under-par, just as her coleader Diaz dropped to six-under-par after 18.

In 2000, Juli Inkster successfully defended her title with a tournament-record final score of 13-under 275. The Hall of Famer closed with an even-par 72 in windy conditions for a five-stroke victory over Brandie Burton. Only eight players finished the tournament under par.

In 1999, Juli Inkster fired a final-round 70 on Easter Sunday to preserve a four-stroke victory. She recorded rounds of 69-67-74-70 for a -8, 280. With wind gusts up to 35 mph during the tournament, Inkster not only battled the other LPGA professionals but the weather as well. She recorded five birdies in the final round, including three in a row, to offset three bogeys and secure the win.

In 1998, Donna Andrews birdied three of the final five holes to win the tournament. Andrews, who began the final day tied for the lead with Sweden's Carin Koch and played with her in the final twosome, shot a 3-under-par 69 for her fourth straight sub-par round. She finished with a 72-hole total of 10-under 278.

In 1997, Annika Sorenstam parred the second hole of a playoff with Pamela Kometani to win. Both players carded pars at the first playoff hole, the par-4 18th, before moving to the par-3 13th, where Kometani bogeyed and Sorenstam parred for her third win of the season. Both players completed 72 holes in 3-under 285. In the playoff at the 13th, Sorenstam knocked her tee shot on the green and her birdie attempt stopped six inches from the cup before she tapped in for par. Kometani's tee shot missed the green. She chipped within two feet but missed the par putt.

In 1996, Kelly Robbins sank a 20-foot putt to birdie the fifth playoff hole against Val Skinner to win the inaugural Twelve Bridges LPGA Classic. Robbins fired a final-round 64 and Skinner carded a 6-under-par 65 to force the playoff, which started on the 18th hole and alternated with the first hole, both of which are par-4s. The pair finished at 11-under 273. Skinner missed a seven-foot putt on the fourth playoff hole that could have clinched the tournament. They parred the first two extra holes and each bogeyed the third before another par on the fourth. Robbins holed her 20-footer and Skinner missed a chance to tie with a putt from the fringe. Her 64 matched Amy Fruhwirth's course record round from earlier in the day.
